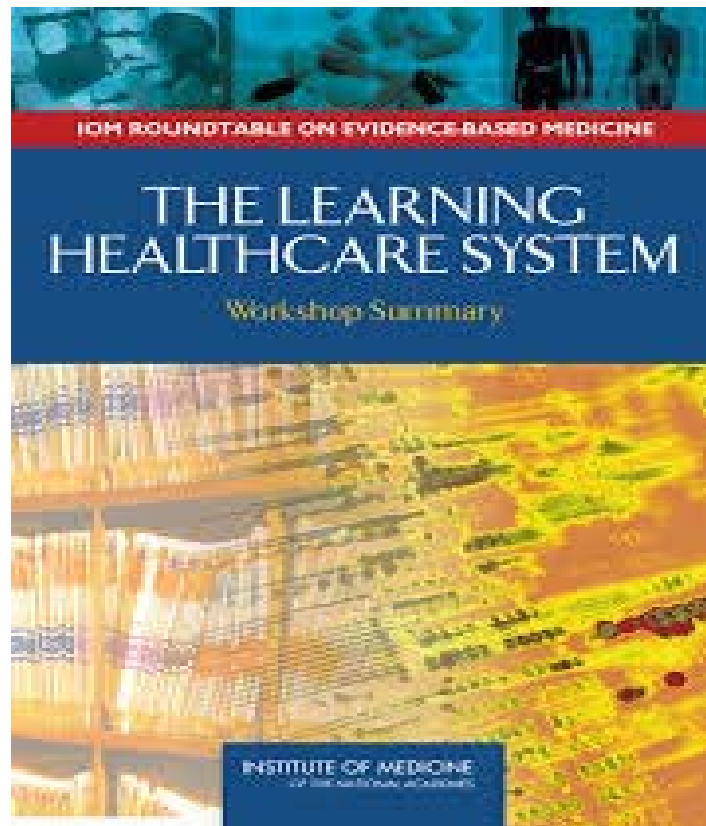

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Background

Learning Health Care Systems Concept



Aim

To determine systematically the spectrum of ethical issues that is raised for stakeholders in a learning health care system.

Methods

1. Inclusion criteria
2. Search strategy and data sources
3. Study selection
4. Data analysis and synthesis

Overarching theme: current
regulatory system vs learning
health care

Discussion

Key strategies to address conflict

1. Replace research vs non-research distinction
2. Optimising current system
 - Policies and procedures
 - Training and guidance
 - Streamlining processes

Limitations

1. Only two databases
2. Additional search terms not added
3. Only English and German included
4. Definition of “ethical issue”
5. High level of interpretation

Conclusion

Need to balance the protection of individual participants with the social value of improving health care
